- Nelson Mandela was the president of South Africa from 1994 to 1999. His government focused on dismantling the legacy apartheid by tackling institutionalised racism and fostering racial reconciliation.

Slavery was practised throughout colonial India in various manifestations. In reality, the movement of Indians to the Bukharan slave markets did not cease and Indian slaves continued to be sold in the markets of Bukhara well into the nineteenth century. The indian slavery was ended by queen

Victoria.
